Colossian Conclusion

We conclude today our series on Colossians, but the central theme of Paul's letter to this struggling church has not changed from the opening to the concluding verses: **the all-supremacy of Christ.** For the Colossians this was central to their battle with false teachers, but it spilled over into their relationships within their households and now, in the final passages of the letter, into their living as believers interacting with those outside the kingdom day to day.

As usual, Paul lays it out to them very plainly: devote themselves to prayer, be watchful and thankful, pray for the ongoing mission of evangelism in Rome and beyond, be wise and gracious in their conversations and be prepared to make the message of the gospel appetising and full of flavour. Finally, Paul introduces the team labouring on their behalf in the prosecution of the spiritual war in the capital of the Roman empire. People the Colossians might have been aware of but perhaps mysterious figures to us today. And yet each one was regarded by Paul as playing an essential role in achieving the goal of reaching many for Christ: some as encouragers, some wrestling in prayer, some sharing in the work of presenting the message alongside Paul.

The part each plays is valued by Paul and God and is worthy of our consideration all these years on as we take encouragement from this record of their actions. Paul concludes imploring the Colossians to remember his chains, but whose chains are they? The iron chains of the Roman emperor, temporarily detaining Paul from freely proclaiming the gospel, or the metaphorical chains of a prisoner for Christ and the truth of His word which will bind him to his Lord for eternity?

Pray for our persecuted brothers and sisters

In Bhutan there is an increasingly strict emphasis on Buddhism as a core part of the country's heritage, therefore, the government sees its duty to protect Buddhism. Bhutan used to be a Buddhist kingdom for centuries, but has introduced a constitutional monarchy and democratic elections. While there is an attitude that the country is democratic, the Christian minority is denied the right to testify about their faith. The commonly held belief is that Christians should not seek to introduce others to their faith. In addition to this, is impossible for a church to be registered or to have a building, as the government restricts the building of any non-Buddhist worship buildings, and the celebration of some non-Buddhist festivals.

The Church in Bhutan is permitted to meet in private homes, and therefore is no longer a country-wide underground church, however, Christians in remote or rural areas still encounter many difficulties. Meetings in remote villages continue to be monitored and disturbed. The Buddhist monks oppose the presence of Christians, and the government is more likely to side with the monks. In March 2014, two pastors were detained and seven weeks later released on bail, without publishing formal charges. In September they were sentenced to four years and two years and four months, respectively, for allegedly committing a felony by raising funds for personal gain. Pastor Mon Thapa was then released in September and Pastor Tandin Wangyal was released in January, both after paying fines. The government will continue to fulfill its duty in protecting Buddhism as the spiritual heritage of Bhutan, and this will continue to impact the Christian minority in the country.
